



Statement of Reason- Community Contribution

Senator Reverend Raphael Warnock grew up in Kayton Homes public housing in Savannah, born one of twelve brothers and sisters raised in coastal Georgia. His father, a veteran, small businessman, and preacher, grew up in Burke and Screven County, GA. Senator Reverend Warnock's mother grew up in Waycross, GA, where she spent summers picking tobacco and cotton.

A graduate of Savannah's Sol C. Johnson High School, Senator Raphael Warnock's mother and extended family still lives in the Savannah area. Senator Warnock is a proud graduate of Morehouse College; after graduating from Morehouse, he went onto earn a PhD and begin his career ordained in the ministry. For over 15 years, Senator Warnock has served as Senior Pastor at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta, the former pulpit of Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. He is the youngest pastor selected to serve in that leadership role at the historic church.

Senator Warnock was elected as a Democrat to the United States Senate in the January 5, 2021, special election runoff for the term ending January 3, 2023, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Johnny Isakson, a seat previously held by appointed Senator Kelly Loeffler. He took the oath of office on January 20, 2021.

This designation is important because it recognizes the historic nature of having a US Senator with local Savannah roots. The petitioner, Mayor Van Johnson commented "I think it's even more historic that he is a product of public housing," and "I think it's important for little boys who grow up on that block to know that greatness is not defined by where you live."

Senator Reverend Raphael Warnock achievements serve as a testament to Savannahians on how we can overcome obstacles and make positive change.

Requirements for Honorary Street Naming Designations. (Sec.4-1104)

Purpose

✓ Honorary street name designations are intended to recognize individuals who have made significant contributions to the City. The designation will be a temporary assignment of the honorarium and shall not interfere with the official name of the street.

Restrictions

- ✓ Roadways under the control of the Federal Highway Administration, Georgia Department of Transportation or Chatham County are not subject to honorary naming.
- ✓ Honorary designations shall be limited to one approved designation per City Council member per calendar year.
- ✓ Individual family tributes, commercially concerned and corporate-related recognitions shall not be eligible for honorary designation.

Requirements

- ✓ The proposed namesake made a sustained contribution over an appreciable time period, exerted efforts of benefit or significance to local, state or national affairs and/or demonstrated leadership in governmental, cultural or historical affairs, humanitarian efforts, or community development;
- ✓ The proposed namesake made contributions that beneficially changed the nature and characteristics of the community;
- ✓ The proposed namesake resided in the City for at least 5 years.
- ✓ A statement of reasons supporting the honorary naming request, including a discussion of the historical significance, contributions, heroic service or personal sacrifice by the honoree to the City, state or nation;
- ✓ Identification of the particular section or block of an existing City street for which the honorary designation is sought.
- ✓ A supporting petition signed by not less than 51 percent of all property owners abutting the subject right-of-way
- ✓ An endorsement by the current Mayor, an at-large alderman or the alderman representing the district in which the property is located.
- ✓ A check for \$150 made to the City of Savannah



in Herbert L. Kayton Homes

Cape Street is an east-west street located in Herbert L. Kayton Homes, connecting Morris Brown Drive to Brewer Street. The street pattern and street names within Kayton Homes were originated with the development of this housing complex in the early 1960s. To date, the inspiration for the name Cape has not been determined and no record of it has been found in City of Savannah government records. Attempts to locate a source through Housing Authority of Savannah records or other contemporary sources have not yielded results.




Map of Herbert L. Kayton Homes indicating Cape Street from sagis.org (accessed February 16, 2021)

The original street pattern of this area was destroyed by Urban Renewal and the introduction of Herbert L. Kayton Homes. City maps like the detailed Savannah Cadastral Survey Ward Maps below from 1939 show an entirely different system of streets prior to Urban Renewal, with names including Maple, Oak, Charles, Russell, and Magnolia. In the 1960s, Urban Renewal completely wiped out not only these streets, but the community anchored by them, as clearly shown in the Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps from 1955 (before) and 1963 (after) in the following pages.









The City of Savannah government partnered with the Housing Authority of Savannah to appraise properties along West Broad Street for Urban Renewal purposes. In January 1961, the City transferred the tract for Kayton Homes to the Housing Authority (Deed Book 79T-Folio 335).

Herbert L. Kayton Homes was opened in 1962 by the Housing Authority of Savannah. The public housing complex was named for Herbert L. Kayton, former board chairman and vice-chairman, who served on the Housing Authority's board for over twenty years. The complex includes 164 apartments that range from one to five-bedroom units.
