BACKGROUND


- Savannah National Historic Landmark District (NHLD) original designation focused on Oglethorpe Plan and architecture
- August 2018: NPS released assessment of the integrity and condition of the NHLD
 - Satisfactory (Priority 3)
 - Watch (Priority 2)
 - Threatened (Priority 1)
 - Emergency
- Status refers to the possibility the historic character of the district may be lost—not that the landmark designation may be revoked





IDENTIFIED CHALLENGES


- Preserve and maintain the elements of the Oglethorpe Plan
- Preserve historic development patterns (large scale development and additions)
- Respond to natural disasters
- Consider noise and traffic
- Protect archeology resources
- Preserve historic pavement materials





Unique Features of NHLD

- Large size of the historic district
- Living and breathing city—constantly
 evolving to meet the needs of its residents
- Resource types:
 - buildings dating from different periods
 - structures and circulation features
 - fences and sculptural features
 - archeological and natural resources







STEWARDSHIP

- Acknowledges the responsibility for stewardship of the district:
 - City of Savannah
 - Federal and state governments
 - Private organizations
 - Citizens









NEXT STEPS

- City's Planning and Urban Design Department:
 - Coordinate response with partners
 - Upgrade the district's current condition back to "satisfactory"
 - Develop archeology ordinance and historic pavement material ordinance (1st Quarter 2019)
 - Address additional tasks outlined in Work Plan
