ISSUE:

A petition to amend the Victorian District Historic Buildings Map to include 60 buildings of historic and architectural significance that were built in the Victorian District prior to 1923 and not previously listed as "contributing/historic."

BACKGROUND:

The Victorian Planned Neighborhood Conservation District (Victorian PNC) was created in 1981 as part of the Zoning Ordinance for the City of Savannah. The purpose of the Victorian PNC is to promote sensitive rehabilitation of existing historic buildings and ensure the visual compatibility of new construction within the area.

Within the Victorian District, all buildings are classified as either contributing (historic) or noncontributing (non-historic) on the Victorian District Historic Buildings Map. The map was adopted in 1981 by City Council and, except for the addition of 912 Drayton Street in 2004, has not been updated since that time.

The age of the current map and the realization that many buildings constructed before 1923 were overlooked in the original map spurred this update. The State Historic Preservation Office recommends that surveys be updated a minimum of every 10 years; the current Victorian District survey/map is 37 years old.

Taking no action leaves many buildings unprotected. The state enabling legislation provides for the preservation and protection of historic buildings, structures, appurtenances, and places that are of basic and vital importance for the development and maintenance of Savannah's tourism industry, its culture, and for the protection of property values because of their association with history, and their unique architectural details. An on-going update of the Victorian District Historic Buildings Map is vital to this mandate.

FINDINGS:

- 1. Currently, all buildings within the local design review area for the Victorian Historic District are reviewed for any exterior changes visible from a public right-of-way. However, only those buildings that are listed as contributing on the Historic Buildings Map require Board Review for demolition.
- 2. All buildings listed as non-contributing on the Historic Buildings Map that fit within the current Period of Significance (1870-1923) were analyzed by the MPC Historic Preservation Department following the 2016-2017 historic preservation fund grant project to resurvey the Victorian District. The consultant that performed the resurvey recommended an update to the map in their survey report. Staff used criteria based on the "National Register Criteria for Evaluation" as follows:
 - a. Is the building associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad pattern of history?
 - b. Is the building associated with the lives of persons significant in the past?
 - c. Does the building embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction?
 - d. Does the building possess integrity of location?
 - e. Does the building possess integrity of design and materials?
 - f. Does the building possess integrity of setting?

Also consulted were the following documents: The 1973 "A Survey of Savannah's Historic District" by Historic Savannah Foundation, the 1980 "Victorian District Building Survey and Evaluation" by Beth Lattimore Reiter (Historic Preservation Consultant), "Savannah Victorian District: Rehabilitation Design Guidelines" by the MPC, HSF, and the City of Savannah, the 1974 "Victorian District National Register Nomination," and the 1980 "Victorian District National Register Boundary Amendment."

3. 40 of the buildings to be added are vernacular lane buildings. Other proposed additions include some rare building styles such as a Mission Revival apartment building, a Gothic Revival church, and two Italianate commercial buildings. All 60 buildings fall within the current Period of Significance and were likely overlooked when the map was originally created.

POLICY ANALYSIS:

- 1. Taking no action leaves many buildings unprotected especially with regard to demolition. These include all lane buildings which are important to the overall historic urban plan of the Victorian Historic District.
- 2. The State enabling legislation for the Victorian Historic District provides for the preservation and protection of historic buildings, structures, appurtenances, and places that are of basic and vital importance for the development and maintenance of Savannah and Chatham County's heritage tourism industry, its culture, and for the protection of property values because of their association with history, their unique architectural details, or their being a part of or related to a park or area, the design or general arrangement of which should be preserved and/or developed according to a fixed plan based on economic, cultural, historical motives or purposes.

Creating a plan for on-going review, evaluation, and protection of these historic resources is consistent with the policy of protecting the City's historic buildings.

ALTERNATIVES:

- 1. Recommend approval of the request to amend the Zoning Ordinance as proposed.
- 2. Recommend an alternate amendment.
- 3. Recommend denial of the request.

RECOMMENDATION:

Amend the Victorian District Historic Buildings Map to include 59 buildings constructed prior to 1923 and not previously listed as contributing, excluding 17 East Anderson Street [AKA 1400 Bull Street].

ANALYSIS OF SELECTED BUILDING TYPES FOR ADDITION TO THE VICTORIAN DISTRICT HISTORIC BUILDINGS MAP

The Victorian District is a 78 block area contiguous to the Savannah National Historic Landmark District that forms a cohesive unit made up of Victorian era buildings. The district also includes the southern portion of Forsyth Park which was originally added for military purposes and became known as the military parade ground. The district possesses a rich collection of late 19th century and early 20th century architecture. These buildings attest to Savannah as a modern evolving city. It is for these reasons that the building fabric should be analyzed on a continuous basis to ensure the preservation of the essential elements from the Victorian era. It is also imperative to recognize the importance of vernacular lane buildings within the overall development of the district.

Lane Buildings: 40 of the 60 buildings proposed to be added to the Historic Buildings Map are lane buildings. Along these lanes are 1 and 2-story buildings that were often built prior to the main building and were either occupied by workers that were constructing the main dwellings throughout the district or were occupied by the families themselves as they awaited the completion of their main dwelling. Also among these lane buildings are auto storage buildings and horse stables that served the main dwellings facing streets. These buildings are one of the reasons that the district has been able to adapt to the modern era of rental properties and automobile storage. These buildings possess distinctive characteristics that are a part of the social and architectural history of the Victorian Historic District.
