Goal: 1.4: Medical 911 Basic Life Support and Advanced Life Support Services

By 2023, Savannahians making 911 calls for an emergency medical incident will receive first responder or higher level services within 5 minutes or less, at least 90% of the time.

In April of 2018 we secured funding and began training Firefighters as Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT).


- Training began June 4th, 2018
- Training lasts two months per training group of 21 firefighters
- 42 Firefighters trained in 2018
- 63 additional Firefighters will be trained each year until all 333 firefighters are trained



EMT Training: Funding

- Service Enhancement funds approved through the planning process to support the Savannah Forward strategic plan.
- Budgeted funds are used for:
 - Training courses
 - Training equipment
 - State licensure application
 - State mandated refresher and continuing education
- Work Source Coastal
 - Incumbent worker training grant that reimburses Savannah Fire 50% of the training costs for each EMT class







EMTTraining: Skills

- Fracture Immobilization






Why is this program needed in Savannah?

- EMT training integrated into firefighter training academy.
- Naloxone (Narcan) on all Savannah Fire apparatus in January of 2019.
- Partnering with Georgia Trauma Commission and Memorial Health to conduct Savannah-based Pedestrian injury research.
- Partnering with Georgia EMS Association, Georgia Office of EMS, Burn and Reconstructive Centers of America, Department of Public Health to provide bestpractices.
- Continue programs to support fire-based EMS delivery.
