Berkshire Study Recommendations (COMPLETED)

- > Take steps to reinforce the importance of patrol
- ➤ Modify lieutenant assignments
- > Reduce civilian staffing in the pawn shop unit
- > Rotate call-out responsibility among all CID lieutenants
- ➤ Modify K-9 officer schedules
- > Review resources assigned to mounted unit
- > Improve traffic enforcement officer schedules
- > Expand responsibilities of traffic Lieutenant
- Establish recruiting goals
- > Encourage patrol officers to support Crime-Stoppers

- > Select desired service levels and modify staffing
- Explore alternative approaches to providing services to other agencies (MOU's completed)
- ➤ Modify take home car policies
- ➤ Strengthen management and supervisory training and increase staffing by one position every supervisor has completed (LPO) Leadership in Police Organizations conducted by IACP (Int'l Assoc of Chiefs of Police)
- ➤ Ensure officers do not refer residents to customer service instead of writing a report



Berkshire Study Recommendations (Pending)

- ➤ Develop plan to address short and long term tech investment needs
- Develop approaches for ensuring consistency among patrol managers
- Modify approach to collecting evidence at crime scenes
- ➤ Develop "work around" to address accident reporting issues
- ➤ Incorporate community outreach into crime reduction continuing
- ➤ Improve physical security for customer service staff
- > Develop case file management alternatives

- ➤ Officer Retention/Improved Deployment:
 - -Improve shift rotation policies (delayed by other city bureaus)
 - -Establish ways for officers to make productive use of time while waiting to testify in court (completed pending delays in shift rotation)



2018 ShotSpotter Results

- Jan–July 2018: 323 ShotSpotter Reports (1,128 total rounds fired)
 YTD 2017: 1,013 ShotSpotter Reports (1,841 total rounds fired)
- 61 unique NIBIN leads from collected shell casings from ShotSpotter reports.
- ShotSpotter responses provided evidence in:
 - 2 homicides
 - 3 robberies
 - 20 aggravated assaults
 - 6 drug/gun possession charges
 - Other misc, criminal offenses



ShotSpotter Results

- Only 26% of ShotSpotter alerts resulted in a 911 calls. 74% (764) of Gunfire incidents were identified by ShotSpotter
- Casings were collected in 20% of incidents.

EXAMPLE: July 3, 2018

Officers respond to a ShotSpotter alert and found an armed subject. Suspect fled, but responding officers recovered a weapon, including 21 .22-caliber shell casings, along with 34 .45-caliber shell casings, and an abandoned vehicle with marijuana and ecstasy pills.





Traffic Fatalities – Savannah

 - 5 involved pedestrians








Aldermanic District 3







Marijuana Ordinance and Hands Free

Marijuana Ordinance

- Effective July 1st in the City of Savannah
- All officers have received training regarding the new ordinance
- From July 1 July 14, there have been **19 people cited** under the ordinance.

Hands-Free Law

- Effective July 1st in Georgia
- Officers are provided violators with pamphlets regarding the new law and and rewarding drivers for complying (hands-free brackets and movie passes).
- Officers are providing warnings for the first 30 days for the first offense.
- From July 1 July 14, officers issued 83
 written warnings.



Technology



Drones

- ➤ Primary uses;
 - > Crash and crime scene documentation
 - > Search & rescue (missing children, elderly, etc.)
 - > Tactical operations (barricaded gunmen, active shooter, etc..)
- ➤ Being used increasingly by public safety
- > Research completed
- > Proposed funding from condemned funds
- > Currently working on procurement & community input



Mobile Office Work Platform

- ➤ Allows for quicker response:
 - Establishes quicker incident command
 - CID can obtain search/arrest warrants remotely
 - Remote communication with judicial officials
- ➤ Completed April 2018.









Enhancements

- ➤ Police IT Plan: Working with a vendor to develop a plan that will help drive technology based decisions
- ➤ Data Management: Problem continues to worsen
 - ➤ One recent homicide case generated over 40 interviews (excluding other digital evidence) that will require almost indefinite storage
 - > #1 IT challenge currently facing SPD
 - > Awaiting funding
- ➤ Records Management System
 - > Existing RMS system is 11+ years old and lacks modern features and efficiencies
 - > New system would include electronic ticketing and other features
 - ➤ Awaiting funding

Sworn Officer Staffing

- 538 Officers (includes those in Academy and Patrol School); Full staff is 536.
 - Includes 3 officers GOHS Heat grant
 - Includes 15 officers COPS grant
- 17 recruits in the Academy. Followed by 7 week patrol school then 15 week PTO (Police Training Officer) March 2019
- 15 are in PTO. They will assume full duties November 2018.
- 10 applications received for week of July 1
- 7 pending resignations in the next two weeks
- 27 sworn officers (corporal and above) hired by CCPD
