Mayor, City Council, Commissioners,

Moving to Savannah almost 20 years ago, I found the city to be aesthetically pleasing with good food, a subtropical climate, and a less expensive to live.

Before the actual move, I knew little about the "Hostess" city and more about Atlanta. But ever curious I wanted to check it out. Going online, I found the landscape; the Squares laid out by Oglethorpe, the Victorian houses downtown representing the antebellum South, the trolley's, City Market and famous River St. of course. I discovered Tybee Island, Savannah State University founded for free enslaved people and Paula Deens restaurant where tourist stood in line for hours waiting to dine on southern cuisine.

What I did not find was anything in the travel brochures that showed pictures or told the story of the History of Slavery that took place in Savannah. Savannah has an African American Population of roughly 52 percent, it was higher 20 years ago. Yet, I saw nothing that let me know that more than half the residents in "the Hostess

City" were African Americans. I read the stats, but there was little if any representation in the brochures. Nor was there much listed about their accomplishments, businesses, or neighborhoods. Where were they in those brochures I pondered?

Almost 20 years later, As a retired teacher, my answer would be: **Erased.**Invisible in an odd kind of way. Of course, I see them now since I live here. Yet, in some ways their contributions writ large, presence and power still seems historically vague here. As a taxpayer, I am aware of the stats about income disparities, housing and educational disparities and the current gentrification going on in Savannah only too well. So I won't list them here. But I know they are abysmal.

Just think what renaming the square, **Susie King Taylor Square** could mean to those African American families who feel and are left out in many ways here. Perhaps a sense of pride? dignity? Contribution that someone who looks like them finally has a prominent place in the History of this quiet southern city. Might young Black men who see this new name and who might otherwise be inclined to join a gang, be prompted to believe there might be ancestors who paved a way for him and choose differently?

Adding more police might not reduce crime in our city, but feeling as if one Belongs and has a Place here, will. Browsing online recently, I note there was just ONE African American Tour company listed, I saw few if any other African American businesses mentioned. Twenty years have passed and sadly the Erasure and invisibility of Black progress in Savannah persists.

You have a "golden" opportunity to make historic change in "The Hostess City" by renaming the square in question, **Susie King Taylor Square**. I implore you to do your part, on your watch, to stop the historical erasure of African American history in Savannah with this act. I would love to see this in the brochures going forward.

My husband and I have lived on the square formerly known as Calhoun since May 1, 2017, at 122 E Taylor Street. We submit that our square be named after Susie King Taylor. Renaming this square after SKT meets all criteria and requirements as outlined in the document (Article E. Naming and Renaming of Public Property, Facilities and Streets).

Susie King Taylor exemplified bravery and humanity—she was a teacher, the first Black Army nurse during the American Civil War, and the only formerly enslaved woman to publish a memoir of her experiences. She learned to read and write at a time when it was forbidden for the enslaved and then gave back by teaching others to read and write through the school she established while living in Savannah, Georgia. In two short years, she opened and taught formerly enslaved people at least at three schools in Georgia. In 2018, Susie King Taylor was elected to the Georgia Women of Achievement Hall of Fame due to her many significant contributions.

Further, none of the 22 squares in Savannah, Georgia is named after a female or a former enslaved person—enslaved people built this city and *finally* should be honored with a name on our square. And, though they are different "Taylors", Taylor Square on Taylor Street is easy to remember!

My wife and I have lived on the square formerly known as Calhoun since April of 2018, at 115 E. Gordon Street. We submit that our square be named after Susie King Taylor.

Susie King Taylor exemplified bravery and humanity—she was a teacher, the first Black Army nurse during the American Civil War, and the only formerly enslaved woman to publish a memoir of her experiences.
