
### Marker Location:

Public Right-of Way in Liberty Square near the intersection of Montgomery Street and West State Street.

The marker will be located in the public right-of-way in the Northwest corner lot occupied by the Robbie Robinson Parking Garage near the intersection of Montgomery Street, West State Street and West York Street. It will be located in the lawn between the walking path, sidewalk and parking garage adjacent / to north of a park bench. The City of Savannah Park and Tree Department has reviewed and approved the installation at this location. An 811 request has been submitted to ensure the location is clear of all utilities before installation. The marker's location is historically placed in the location of the first Savannah St. Patrick's Day Parade 200 years ago.





## Marker Theme:

This marker matches several themes including Religious History, Local history, and Cultural and Ethnic Heritage.

# Cultural and Ethnic Heritage

The marker commemorates the cultural and ethnic impact that the Irish community and it parade have had on the Savannah community. The Irish fled to Savannah seeking refuge and have become integrated into the Savannah culture and heritage alongside many other cultural and ethnic traditions.

# Local history

The marker commemorates a local Savannah tradition of the St. Patrick's Day parade which has transformed from an Irish celebration into a community-wide celebration. This marker highlights the local history and importance of the St. Patrick's Day Parade to all of the Savannah Community.

# **Religious History**

The Historical Marker commemorates the Irish Catholic pride and religious freedoms that was and is now exhibited in Savannah and the United States.
